

Garden Report: September 2021

### Monitoring:

CoCoRaHS rain gauge watchers reported 3.04 inches of precipitation. Average for September is 3.1 inches.

#### Observations of note:

 September interest: Summer blooms began to fade as the fall season took over. However, the warm temperatures and typical precipitation have kept a few summer stragglers around, such as Cardinal Flower and Tall Bellflower. These species are blooming unusually late this year. Asters, Black Eyed Susan, and White Turtlehead are currently in peak bloom.

 Regular workdays occur each Friday from 9:00-11:00am, weather dependent. The RORG Team and regular volunteers have continued to welcome and train new volunteers from the Champaign County Master Gardeners and East Central Illinois Master Naturalist programs. ### • Fall 2021 Projects:

- With funds from the Illinois Clean Energy Community Foundation Community Stewardship Grant, the RORG team expanded the rain garden and installed several trees between RORG and the McKinley Health Center parking lot. Work is ongoing around the Dorner Drive Retention Pond to convert what had been poor quality low-mow with high quality native vegetation.
- CCMG & ECIMN volunteers, UIUC students from Landscape Architecture, Horticulture, and ASLA, Girl Scout Troop #2915, and various volunteers from around campus worked to install over 1,400 plants.
